

- The largest agriculture related manufacturing establishments in District 5 are furniture & related products (51), food (50), textiles (26), wood products (21), paper (12), and apparel (8).



- The largest agriculture related employment manufacturers are food, textiles, furniture & related products, beverage & tobacco products, paper, wood products, and apparel.

- Despite the highly urbanized nature of District 5, the county is home to over 1,500 farms, with the land in farms in excess of 156,000 acres. Crop acres exceed 64,200 acres.



- The top four crops include hay (30,460 acres), corn for grain (1,670 acres), soybeans (1,100 acres), and tobacco (420 acres). Wheat is grown on 170 acres.

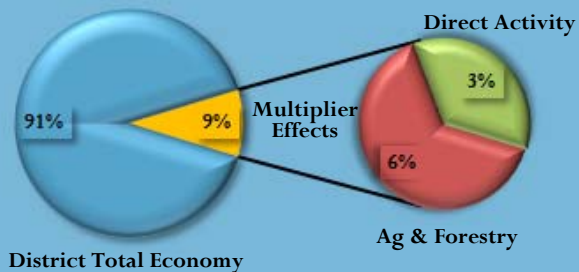


- There are over 18,250 beef cattle in District 5 with 265 milk cows. In addition, there are 260 head of hogs and over 132 thousand broilers.



- Pastureland totals 88,710 acres and woodland totals 36,300 acres.

### District 5-Economic Contributions of Ag and Forestry to the Economy, 2009



- The market value of agricultural products sold \$25.1 million of which 54.8% is from crops (including nursery & greenhouse) and 45.2% if from livestock and their products.



- Over \$1 out of every \$10 in the economy is directly or indirectly derived from agriculture and forestry related industries.
- 1 out of 20 jobs is directly or indirectly derived from agriculture and forestry related industries.

\*Direct effects are the economic impacts due to industry activity. Total effects also include impacts due to supplying industries and the impact effects household incomes have on the economy. Tennessee's Congressional Districts contain partial counties but the model used to estimate the economic impacts, IMPLAN, is modeled on a county basis. Consequently, double counting may occur when comparing the economic impacts of one District to another or trying to sum to statewide values.
